IT IS AN HONOR FOR ME TO SHARE THE 2017-18 A.S. ANNUAL REPORT WITH YOU.

It was such a pleasure serving our fellow students, with such a dedicated and fun-loving leadership team. I am so proud of the transformative endeavors we accomplished. This is a historic and exciting time to be on campus, as we continue to work on behalf of students.

Last fall, based on concerns of students, A.S. hosted an open forum about campus safety with SDSU Police Chief Mays and other campus partners. This led to the establishment of the Campus Safety Committee, whose sole mission it is to inform the SDSU community of resources and address safety concerns. A successful Campus Safety Week was held last spring and there are plans for another this fall.

I am so proud that Associated Students also continues to help students on campus reach food security. During Aztecs Rock Hunger, the annual campus food drive, with the generosity of the SDSU family, A.S. collected over 588,000 pounds of food for the Jacobs and Cushman San Diego Food Bank. 20% of the monetary donations, a total of \$19,000 dollars, came back to the SDSU Economic Crisis Response Team, to assist SDSU students. The Aztecs Rock Hunger collection also provides the food for the A.S. food pantry, which expanded to two days a week, this year. At the food pantry, food insecurity resource education and Calfresh outreach is offered to students. Additionally, this past spring, through generous support from a donor and SDSU faculty and staff, A.S. coordinated the Swap Shop, which provided professional clothing to SDSU students. It is so heartwarming to be a part of a campus that comes together to help both the larger San Diego community and SDSU students.

With the highest voter turnout in modern times, students voted to expand the Aztec Recreation Center, also known as the ARC, and fields on campus. More importantly, once implemented, all students will have access to the ARC and its programs, to support student health and wellness. This will put A.S. in line with other university recreation programs. We are excited about how serving more of the student body will transform and grow our recreation offerings. Student health and wellness is vital to overall student success and we are proud to contribute in this way.

We very much enjoyed working with Interim
University President Sally Roush. She is an
advocate for all students and was true partner in
shared governance. We also excitedly welcomed.
Dr. Adela de la Torre, as the new permanent
University President.

Finally, we continue to look for new additional ways to grow our sustainability efforts. A.S. launched the oFo bike sharing pilot program to help promote alternative transportation on campus.

We will show students through our actions that A.S. is here for them, cares about them, and advocates for them. We have so much planned for the new year and we look forward to leaving our heart-print on SDSU.



A.S.GOVERNMENTAFFAIRS

he highest decision making organization within the student government at SDSU is the A.S. Board of Directors and its three A.S. Councils, the A.S. Campus Life Council, A.S. University Council and A.S. Judicial Affairs Council. The backbone of the student government are the A.S. boards, committees, and commissions which offer great opportunities for current students to become active members and leaders within the SDSU community.

ASSOCIATED STUDENTS GOVERNMENT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Expanded A.S. Food Pantry to two days and increased food insecurity resource education and Cal Fresh outreach. 119,725 pounds of food distributed.
- Aztec Rocks Hunger raised 588,915 pounds of food including \$20,000 for SDSU students facing food insecurity, which goes to ECRT to provide meal vouchers and grocery gift cards to students in need.
- Established cross campus safety committee, including Chief of Police Josh Mays, to address student safety and security issues. This committee coordinated the inaugural Campus Safety Week which educated students on the different facets of safety on campus.
- Supported Black Resource Center, which opened this year, with \$40,000 annual program fund commitment.
- Implemented OFO campus bike sharing pilot program.
- 23% voter turnout, the highest in A.S. history, voted in the Transform the ARC referendum, to renovate and expand the ARC and recreation fields.
- In April, with support from a donor and with generous donations from SDSU faculty and staff, A.S. coordinated the Swap Shop, which provided professional clothing to SDSU students.



UNIONPROGRAMS **ANDSERVICES**

amed after local philanthropist, Conrad Prebys, the Conrad Prebys Aztec Student Union, is the home away from home and the community center for the SDSU campus. It was made possible by former SDSU students who voted to build an all new Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Platinum student union. The facility has since earned LEED Double Platinum status, making it one of the most sustainable facilities in the world. The Union is entirely student-fee funded and receives no State funding. The building includes Montezuma Hall, a 300-seat theatre, eateries, meeting spaces, student lounge, bowling center, and satellite gym. It is also the home of the Associated Students office, the Center for Intercultural Relations office, and Student Life and Leadership office.

UNIONPROGRAMS ANDSERVICES

CONRAD PREBYS AZTEC STUDENT UNION ACCOMPLISHMENTS

THE UNION CONTINUES TO CALL ITSELF HOME TO THE 35,000 STUDENTS HERE AT SDSU, PROVIDING THEM A VARIETY OF PLACES TO MEET, DINE, EXERCISE AND UNWIND. IT WAS A BUSY & SUCCESSFUL YEAR FOR THE UNION TEAM, WITH A NUMBER OF MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENTS:

- Opened The Backdoor Studio, a creative outlet open to all SDSU students. Named in honor of The Backdoor, a unique music venue within the old Aztec Center, it is a space for students to record and produce their art, as well as hang out and express their creativity with friends. This multimedia studio offers equipment for professional recording and producing technology, and is staffed by a student technician to guide equipment use.
- The Aztec Student Union Board's Union
 Beautification Committee (UBC) completed a
 series of workshops to develop a five-year plan
 to "beautify" the public spaces of the Union by
 incorporating artwork, furnishings, technology and
 other enhancements. Upcoming additions to the
 building include additional seating in the
 Goldberg Courtyard.
- The expanded hours of the University Information
 Center the previous year provided the opportunity

- for students this year to use open meetings rooms on a first-come, first-served basis. This was especially helpful to those needing a quiet place to study and groups looking for space for class project meetings.
- The Aztec Student Union Board (ASUB) continued to create new and exciting programs to foster a welcoming environment in the "living room" of campus. ASUB collaborated with over 20 campus partners to develop and execute 93 events in the fall and spring semesters. This was the first year Presence was utilized to capture data on student attendees. It was found that of the events where Presence was utilized, 83% were returning students, meaning they've attended previous ASUB events. Additionally, it was found that ASUB events are serving all student levels, with attendance of 32.3% first years, 21.3% sophomores, 22.9% juniors and 23.4% seniors.







AZTECRECREATION

ztec Recreation provides high quality programs, services and facilities that inspire active, healthy living and enhance the SDSU experience. Aztec Recreation includes many recreational and fitness programs, like Aztec Adventures, group fitness classes, instructional credit classes, intramural sports and sports clubs. It also includes facilities such as the Aztec Recreation Center (ARC), the Aztec Aquaplex, Aztec Lanes and the ARC Express in the Conrad Prebys Aztec Student Union, the Recreation Field, and Mission Bay Aquatic Center (MBAC).



AZTEC RECREATION ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Average monthly membership for the academic year remained at record levels with 17,240 members, up from 17,174 members last year.
- The men's water polo club defeated the University of Texas 7-4 to capture the 2017 National Collegiate Club Championship. Senior, Josh Heller, was named tournament MVP.
- The men's volleyball club successfully defended their 2017 national championship title by defeating Cal Poly San Luis Obispo 25-19, 25-22 to win the 2018 NCVF Division I National Collegiate Volleyball Championship. Outside hitter Andrew Freiha was named tournament MVP.
- Intramural Sports official Jackson Good earned a
 bid to officiate at the NIRSA National Basketball
 Championship tournament at The Ohio State
 University in April due to his outstanding
 performance at the NIRSA West Regional
 Basketball tournament. This marked the second
 year in a row that Jackson was selected
 for this honor.
- Aztec Adventures Climbing Lead, Bradley Mills, was honored with the McCarron Exemplary Service Scholarship.
- Aztec Recreation co-hosted the three day NIRSA
 Region VI Conference in Mission Bay for over
 300 recreation professionals from western region
 universities in November 2017.
- The Mission Bay Aquatic Center (MBAC) successfully completed a large scale lobby renovation.

- The MBAC Watersports camp witnessed record participation with 2,730 campers.
- On March 6 & 7, SDSU students voted to approve a large scale expansion and renovation of the Aztec Recreation Center (ARC) and recreation field space. The ARC will be expanded from 78,000 sq./ft. to approximately 148,000 sq./ft. Construction is scheduled to begin in summer of 2019 with completion slated for fall of 2021. With the approval of the referendum, all SDSU students will have access to Aztec Recreation facilities and the opt-in membership model for students will be eliminated in Fall of 2021.

ne of the premier on-campus indoor basketball arenas in all of America, Viejas Arena at Aztec Bowl provides a 12,414-seat, state-of-the-art venue while keeping fans close to the floor and part of the action. The Arena provides quality entertainment with impeccable acoustics and sight lines. Viejas Arena hosts athletic events, concerts, conferences, lectures, academic gatherings and is home to Aztec Basketball.

The Cal Coast Credit Union Open Air Theatre is a historic outdoor amphitheater able to accommodate approximately 4,800 guests. Our guests experience outdoor ambiance with live entertainment. Recently completed renovations gives the campus grounds a fresh look with modern amenities. The remodeled buildings and structures honor the theme of the University, and creates a welcoming and complete event space.

VIEJAS ARENA AND CAL COAST CREDIT UNION OPEN AIR THEATRE ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- During the 2017-2018 Fiscal Year the Viejas
 Arena and Cal Coast Credit Union Open Air
 Theatre hosted 116 major events not including
 basketball practices. The events brought
 over 490,146 guests to the campus. Events
 included: Thomas Rhett, Jay Z, Demi Lovato,
 Men's Basketball versus Gonzaga, Romeo
 Santos and Miranda Lambert just to name a few.
- The Viejas Arena and Cal Coast Credit Union
 Open Air Theatre provides employment and
 professional development for over 160 San
 Diego State University students in various areas
 including: events, production, ticket office, and
 facility maintenance.
- July, 2017, Associated Students and Live Nation
 Concerts came to an agreement to extend
 our relationship for five more years through
 June, 2022. Live Nation is the largest concert
 promoter in the world and has operated as our
 concert promoter since purchasing House of
 Blues in 2012. Live Nation strives to bring top
 performers to both of our concert venues.
- June 5, 2018, Viejas Arena was recognized
 LEED Gold Existing Building: Operations and
 Maintenance. This certification for LEED Gold
 is for five years. We strive for excellence in all
 areas for sustainable operations including water
 and energy use, recycling and landfill diversion,
 innovation and good environmental practices.
- March, 2018, Viejas Arena and SDSU Athletics


- hosted the Men's NCAA Basketball Tournament. This was our fifth time hosting an NCAA Championship game including: 2001, 2006, 2009, 2014 and 2018. Viejas Arena has been selected to once again host the Men's First and Second Round in 2022.
- June, 2018, Associated Students and San Diego State University came to an agreement with the Viejas Band of Kumeyaay Indians to extend the naming rights for Viejas Arena through June 30, 2029.

BOX OFFICE

The Viejas Arena Box Office is open daily to the public and offers tickets to events hosted at Viejas Arena and the Cal Coast Credit Union Open Air Theatre, discounted theme park tickets, movie passes and MTS Transit passes for SDSU students.

The SDSU Children's Center features a relaxed and loving atmosphere in which children are free to explore, learn and create through play. To foster the development of the whole child, activities are planned to provide maximum physical, social, emotional and intellectual growth and continuous exposure to the tools for learning.

As part of the A.S. mission, the Children's Center aims to serve student families first. We serve just over 200 children daily. Our families are comprised of a mixture of student families, faculty, staff, alumni and community members.
